




Enrollment by High School City & County






FALL ENROLLMENT STATUS


TOTAL STUDENT POPULATION

FALL CLASS LEVEL






FALL CREDIT HOURS DAY/EVENING COURSES




FINANCIAL AID AWARDED PERCENTAGE OF ALL STUDENTS RECEIVING AID



FIRST -TIME STUDENT COHORT*












